- ❖ **Public Safety & Law Enforcement Updates**
 1. **LASD Industry Station: Deputy Jose Cruz**
 - If you have any concerns please call Jose Cruz at 626-934-3083 or email at J4Cruz@LASD.org
 - First, on Saturday, May 22, we are having a Catalytic Converter Event to add license plate#s on the unit. It does require prior registration and because there were so many requests, we are planning on having more such events.
 - Actual Crimes is up 15%.
Assaults - YTD=41 vs Last year=25 – An increase of 64%, we have seen an increase in isolated events such as domestic violence or battery; Robberies: YTD=13 vs Last year=8 – Up 62%;
Residential Burglaries: YTD=41 vs Last year=50 – a decrease 18%, which is good news; Grand Thefts or thefts of Vehicle Burglaries: YTD=170 vs Last Year=166 – a 2% increase; Auto thefts are increasing YTD is 71 vs last year was 42 – an increase of 69%; We like to remind everyone – please do not leave valuables in plain view, park in a well-lit area, and lock your vehicles.
 - Major incidents: One is home invasion on May 2nd, between 2-4 am on Sunday. A Male adult entered the home of an Elderly female who was raped. With numerous resources available throughout the county, we were able to positively identify the suspect. He was ultimately arrested and is currently in custody and no longer poses a threat to the community and is facing numerous charges. This is a high profile case and is being investigated by a special victim’s detective.
The next incident happened on May 16th, about 8 pm, on the corner of Azusa and Colima at the AM/PM in HH. It was a shooting. The victim died. It appears to be an isolated incident – gang related and is under investigation by our homicide detectives.
 - Q/A:
 - Q: Are Supervisors Solis and Hahn providing extra funds to the Industry Station to help combat the gang issues? A: We are able to have our summer enforcement team which started this month and will continue through September. All the Stations are funded by the total Board this year. It targets the increased crime in the county during the summer months.

- Q: Is the Industry Station fully staffed? A: Short answer no. However, we have about 200 positions. It is rare to have 200 deputies, bodies, on deck and available to patrol. We compensate this using overtime. So we are not fully staffed but we have deputies on-duty by using overtime to fill gaps.
- Scott Martin and Maury Edwards will be meeting with Lt. Hoang to discuss FTE assignments based on the funding which is received by the Lt. Hoang’s dept from the Board of Supervisors.

2. CHP Santa Fe Springs Station: Ofc. M. Iniguez

For the month of March activity for the Santa Fe Springs area:

- April was distracted driver awareness month. We will be starting Click It or Ticket. So be sure you are wearing your seat belts. A few of the citations issued last month just in our area – 643 for driving while using a cellphone and 537 for driving while texting. That’s over 1,100 citations for cellphone violations.
- Traffic collisions, YTD we investigated 512 vs 690 in 2019. 21 in the HH area. In 2020 during the pandemic we had 14. In 2019 we had 19. So it was an increase from 2019, the last normal year in HH but the Total is lower for the station.
- There are still a lot of vehicles entering and exiting the car pool lane by crossing the solid double yellow or white lines. It is illegal to cross the solid double lines. You have to wait until the double lines are broken. 345 citations were given for crossing the solid double lines out of the carpool lane. Ofc Iniguez personally witnessed a vehicle which impatiently crossed the solid dbl lines from the #1 lane into the carpool lane – cut across a vehicle already in the car pool lane causing that vehicle to flip with a baby in it. 462 citations were issued for being solo in the carpool lane
- Cited 455 people driving over 65 mph, 50 were driving over 100 mph and 193 commercial vehicles driving in the wrong lane.
- There has been an increase of shootings of BB or pellet guns hitting windshields and side windows in LA and Orange Counties. The shootings appear to be totally random. We are hoping drivers will check their dash cams around these incidents and give the investigators additional information, please call 911 and let law enforcement know you have dash or security cam information so they can download the cam information. The freeways involved are the 91, 101 and 605. Please, when driving, pay attention to where you are, the vehicles around you and your surroundings. If anything looks abnormal it could help the officers – vehicle with windows down early in morning, vehicles of the same color around you may match other incidents, vehicle rushing to off-ramp after an incident. Think of expanding your “Community Watch” to include the streets or freeways while driving, and the stores and parking lots when shopping.
- Q&A: Q: What time of day are the shootings happening? A: During commuting hours: around 6:30 am and 3:30 pm.

2. Mountains Recreation & Conservation Authority: Deputy Chief Kenn Hughes

- Thank you for HHIA’s support of the Cal Fire Grant. That’s going to be very useful for preventive efforts and it gives us a multi-year funding for goats in Turnbull Canyon. When used, they clear the area right down to the dirt. They usually bring in about 100 goats to clear about a quarter acre a day. So it’s exciting about what their clearance will do for us.
- We are also hoping to get another Grant from Rivers to Mountains Conservatory.
- On fire prevention and safety our crews are doing their annual fuel clearance right now as they do every year.
- We’re getting ready to install our “slip-on’s” onto our trucks. What this does is give us about 100 gallons of water and a pump and other apparatus that gets our ranger trucks ready for fire patrol. So we’ll be out there in that.
- We also provide extra patrols on special occasions like July 4th. Especially this July 4th because it is on a Sunday, we will probably be out and active all weekend.

❖ **Public Input:** None.

❖ **Presentation: 39th Congressional District.....Congresswoman Young Kim.**

- Thank you the Hacienda Heights Improvement Association for inviting me to join you. It is an honor to give back to this country and community which has given me, an immigrant from South Korea, so much. I grew up and raised my four children in this area. For several decades I worked in the community before being elected to represent you in the US Congress.
- This session of Congress has been a whirl wind. But keeping to my promise to hit the ground running, I’ve been busy here in Washington DC. I’m excited about the three committees I have been assigned to serve on – (1) the House Committee on Foreign Affairs, (2) the House Committee on Small Business, and as a Ranking Member on the subcommittee on Innovation, Entrepreneurship and Workforce Development and (3) the House Committee on Science, Space and Technology.
- There are some regional priorities on which I am working. First is the 57/60 freeways junction. It is a huge

issue for the SGV area. You know if you travel on these two freeways and experience one of the most congested bottle-necks in California. I requested federal funding for the 57/60 confluence project which has been on-going for several years. I did that through the surface transportation reauthorization. I am working in a bi-partisan way with Congresswoman Grace Napolitano who also shares part of that district. Together we led members from the California congressional delegation to send a letter to Secretary of Transportation, Pete Buttigieg, urging the approval of \$30 million in grant funding to support the 57/60 confluence project. Less than 2 weeks ago I joined elected officials from the regional areas of SGV to get an update on the project and to speak about the vital importance of revitalizing the freeways and improving the safety and the movement of goods across our region, State and Country, because it has a lot of implication of the vitality there. So I will continue to fight to get Federal funding to get that project to its completion.

- I also want to update you on the Salt (State and Local Tax) Deductibility Act (HR613) which I am co-sponsoring. As a member of the Salt Caucus to work bipartisan, it is much needed for California tax payers. The focus is to eliminate the \$10,000 cap on the deduction allowed so tax payers will have more money in their pocket.
- In the Small Business Committee, seeing how Small Businesses were hit hardest during the Pandemic, I worked to bring relief to the Small Businesses and our communities by introducing the PPE Extension legislation that extended the deadline to May 31 which increased the number of loans which were requested to help businesses.
- I also introduced 2 other bipartisan bills which helped small manufacturers to get additional funding for their capital access for their manufacturing businesses and a second part which is Credit Risk Management Improvement Act which streamlines the way small manufacturers could apply and get their loan applications processed as soon as possible.
- On the Space and Science Technology Committee I am also working to assure our nation can thrive in stem education to push our frontiers into space – Rural STEM Education Research Act (to improve science, technology, engineering, math, and computer science education in rural communities).
- On the Foreign Affairs Committee building on the strong relationship we have with our allies and holding our adversaries accountable when advancing our interests abroad is a top priority of mine. One of the first bills I worked on which got out of committee is the inclusion of Taiwan getting its observer status back in the WHO (World Health Organization). That was important based on the type of work Taiwan was able to do to quickly contain the Corona Virus from spreading within its own boundaries but also going out to help other countries in need through their PPE and other supplies which were greatly needed especially at the onset of the virus.
- When I campaigned, it was with the promise to work jointly across the aisle. In the first three months of being in Washington, I have introduced 3 bills which have passed the house and one has already been signed into law. I want to continue to be able to work in a bipartisan way. That is the reason I joined the Problem Solvers Caucus. This group believes there are common sense solutions to many of our country's toughest challenges and we need to work together as Americans to break through that gridlock. Right now we have a very slim house majority and a divided Senate. So I hope we will be able to influence what gets done in Congress and make a positive impact by working with this caucus I belong to. So I will continue to work in that fashion and insure the big issues facing our country have solutions that will have an impact that are long lasting. Lastly when I get back to this District, I have been visiting businesses to hear about their concerns and about how our government can help them through this pandemic. Feedback from the community and small businesses are critically important to insure these government programs are working properly and efficiently. I have also visited many of the vaccination sites throughout California but particularly in my District to see first-hand how the vaccination is going. I have also visited schools to discuss their reopening plans and connecting with our community leaders. Also being on the Science, Space and Technology Committee, I was especially excited to be able to visit many impressive technology and aviation companies including NASAU suppliers and operators around the 39th district. I was pleasantly surprised how many companies are located in my 39th District and many are suppliers to NASAU programs to aerospace and shuttles etc. I am very happy to learn all this and it helps with my work on the Science, Space and Technology Committee. I am looking forward to meeting you in person when I get back to the 39th District to learn how I can best serve you.
- Q&A: Q: Regarding Hacienda La Puente Unified School District, one of the largest School Districts in the 39th District, why has this School District remained closed while all the surrounding Districts have opened? There is no hybrid learning or summer school.

A: As a mother of 4, I hear and feel your frustration. We know students learn best when they are in school, so we need to see that students return to school as quickly as possible and with the vaccines being readily available, so teachers can safely return to the class rooms. Recent CDC guidelines say it is safe to open schools. I do not want to overstep local control because people speak about local control so much. So I hope the Hacienda La Puente Unified School District Board Members will now consider the new CDC guidelines and choose to follow those guidelines without further delay. Because the schools that have opened have proven that it can be done safely. I am advocating on your behalf at the federal level. To put our children first and get the

necessary resources to our schools. The longer we delay in opening the schools the more our children suffer especially those who are already struggling. I share your frustration and I do hope your School Board will meet as soon as possible and open your schools soon based on the new CDC guidelines.

Q: What is the Congresswoman's position on stronger firearms controls and implementing a federal waiting period before firearms can be received from the location of purchase? Should, in your opinion, military style semi-automatics, ie AK-47, AR-15, be sold?

A: I want to make sure we keep guns out of the wrong hands and help those who are mentally ill get the help they need. From mental health to other factors we need a holistic and bipartisan solution. We also know there are also many law abiding citizens who own guns in a legal and responsible manner. The second amendment gives them the right to do that. I have supported and co-sponsored common sense legislation like H.R.1518 that's the 21st Century NICS Act which is the national instant criminal background check system. That is a bipartisan bill which will fix the FBI bureaucracy to allow FBI background check examiners to access the FBI national data exchange (N-DEx). The N-DEx is a data base created by the FBI that collects voluntarily submitted data from law enforcement agencies and police. Currently, FBI background check examiners are not allowed access to the FBI N-DEx system when conducting a background check. The Department of Justice Inspector General audit reported that the perpetrator of the 2015 shooting at the Charleston AME church would have failed a background check if the examiner had access to the FBI N-DEx system. This is a common sense solution which would keep guns out of the hands of criminals while not infringing on the rights of the law abiding gun owners. You know when it comes to guns and mass shootings, we also have to remember that people's hearts and minds are the real issue. We cannot legislate that.

Q: As a member of congress, what would your position and record reflect regarding current and future laws attempting to end rights of the LGBTQ community and how will you vote for H.R.5 Equality Act by Rep David Cicilino?

A: I have a record of working for everyone that I'm elected to represent, regardless of their background. I believe everyone regardless of their gender, race or religion deserve to be treated with kindness and respect and that all Americans should have the opportunity to succeed and achieve the American dream just like I did. The Equality Act undermines America's religious freedoms and limits the protections for people of faith and opens the doors for ending the decades long Hayen Amendment.

Q: Elise Stephanic was selected to replace Liz Chaney as Republican House Leadership. Rep Stephanic has promoted election lies and tried to get the 2020 presidential election overturned. Do you think Rep Stephanic is the right choice to lead the party instead of Rep Chaney?

A: Let me start by stating I respect Congresswoman Liz Chaney. But the majority of the Republican conference made the decision on who will serve as our next conference chair. I also have to let you know that I made my views on January 6th very clear and voted to certify the results of the election. My constituents sent me to congress. That includes you to fight for you and break through the patrician gridlock and get things done. That is my focus, now and always. Congresswoman Stephanic has also encouraged me when I first decided to run for office and she has supported many women like me to pursue the elected office. So I am grateful for everything she has done to elevate the Republican women. And I am proud to work alongside her in Congress as I will with Congresswoman Liz Chaney as she continues to serve with us. And we are going to work hard together as a conference to bring results for our districts. And I believe we can get those results. For me I always say the GOP is the Grand Opportunity Party that creates policies that are helping us lower taxes, Lower health care costs, make life more affordable, secure our borders, to allow all Americans succeed just like I did. And I think we can do that together. What we need to do is stay focused and use common sense to move our country forward. And I'm really looking forward to that. I'm a forward looking and forward thinking legislature and I hope I can stay focused in that area.

Q: What is being done to protect immigrant children and young adults in our community who are brought here against their will?

A: We are talking about fixing DOCA once and for all. I have to tell you that I am very much in support in working on a permanent solution to address this issue. As an immigrant myself it is very important to me that those who are here, especially those who were brought to this country as young babies or just a few years old who through no fault of their own they found out they were without status and undocumented. Let's face it they have been here for decades. They are hard-working residents of this country like most of us. I truly believe they deserve to stay here and find some legal way to stay here. Many of them are business owners. Many of them are entrepreneurs. What we need to do is work on a common sense reasonable immigration reform that the previous congresses have failed. It is not Republican or Democratic administration which is to blame. Congress together has failed too long and I hope that now that I am there as an immigrant bringing a unique perspective to the immigration process, we are supporting the legal immigration, but what are we seeing right now particularly at the border? I've gone down to the border myself. I've seen the crisis. What we need to do is secure the border but also address the ongoing issues like fixing DOCA and coming up with a reasonable common sense immigration reform once and for all.

Immigration Reform, Infrastructure Needs, making sure we work on policies that make our country move again, getting us out of this Covid pandemic. These are some of the many priorities I plan on focusing on, addressing in Congress.

1 **Representative 4th Supervisorial District: Lauren Yokomizu (Supervisor Janice Hahn)**

- An announcement was made yesterday in regards to vaccinations. The Phizer vaccines are now available for those 12-17. Currently, those 12-17 can go to any county or city run vaccination site. Some of these are giving out Phizer and some are doing walk-ups.
- St John Vianney in Hac Hts is going to be holding a vaccination clinic on May 26th 9 am. I believe that will be Phizer vaccines and will be open to any Hacienda Heights resident.
- The ground breaking for Dali’s Dog Park at Schabarum Park will be on Fri May 21 10 am. It will open late this year or early next.
- Q&A – Q: Residents around Sigman St and Charlemont Ave have concerns regarding the homeless who have created an encampment behind their back yards. They feel it is getting dangerous and want to know what they can do to make sure their back yard is safe?

A: They should report this. If they feel someone may start a fire or be in a mental health crisis, they should call the Sheriff’s Dept. If we are given the address(es) of where these people are, we can contact our homeless outreach team who can see if they can get the people to accept services which are available to them. I believe we have an email from you, Adriana. I will follow up on it.

Regarding comment regarding risk of fire in the hills, Deputy Chief Hughes stated that they keep an eye out for people trying to camp out and last month he found someone making a shelter just inside the Hacienda Hills Trailhead and he was escorted out. It is a conscience thing they do regularly.

2 **Representative 39th Congressional District: Abigail Fachtmann (Congresswoman Young Kim)**

5 **Hacienda Heights Librarian: Christina Cabrera-Labrador**

- The Hacienda Heights Library has now reopened – Tues 1-8, and Wed-Sat 11-6. A new service, “Press Reader which provides unlimited access to national and international magazines and newspapers on business, tech news, science, design, sports, travel and more, in over 60 languages. All you need is your library card and pin number to create a Press Reader Account.

6 **Hsi Lai Temple: Gena Ooi:**

- On May 4th we had a National Buddhist Memorial Ceremony for Asian American Ancestors. Buddhist monks gathered in the Japanese Buddhist Temple in L.A. We had approximately 1,700 viewers during the live stream. We prayed not only for victims of hate crimes, but also those who committed the crimes due to their ignorance. We had representatives from many different religions at the Temple.
- On May 6th the Mt. SAC Muslim Student Association had an Interfaith Webinar. The main goal was to have an open and fruitful discussion between scholars of various faiths, connect the gaps that separate humanity, pave a way for a more tolerant and beautiful future. It was attended by 18 scholars of the Buddhist, Muslim, Jewish, and Zoroastrian faiths. Each shared their basic teachings, how they deal with the pandemic, common misconceptions, and religious involvement in politics.
- On May 15th the Hsi Lai Center held a Vaccination Center and 500 second shots were given to the community. This was jointly hosted by Hsi Lai Temple, Buddhist Light International Association, with Chinatown Service Center, and KCal Ins. This was the fourth vaccination event held at the Hsi Lai Center and they plan to have another vaccination day in the future.
- Hsi Lai Temple continues to have visiting hours by appointment only on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. Go online to make an appointment. The cafeteria is still closed. Face Masks are still required.

7 **LA Co Parks & Recreation: Brian Ceballos**

- Registration for Summer classes started May 17th. Website: Reservations.LACounty.gov Summer classes start June 1st. They may transition to in-door classes mid to late June. Usage of the facility is in limbo. We are working with our community based groups establishing partnership relationships with and status so that they can continue to use the Community Center in the future when we open up.
- At this time we are still providing our free recreation drop in program offered Tuesday thru Saturday 2:30 – 5:30 pm at all three of our neighborhood community parks – Steinmetz, Manzanita, and HH Comm. Cntr.
- Starting June 14th the summer program will be offered as summer drop in program – Monday thru Friday, 11 am

– 5 pm. There will be several activities in the Rec Center zones – Crafts, Sports, Games and grab & go. With lunches and snacks. It is free for children 7 to 17. It is a non-custodial program which means the park staff will not be in charge of supervision. Families can come to the park but parents will be responsible that their children are supervised. Or children living near the park have the option to drop in and leave during the hours open.

- I’m Cindy Greenup and I moved to Hacienda Heights in 1985/6 from Whittier, prior to that Alaska. I have been a volunteer in HH involved with Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts, with various leadership positions with the scouts, i.e. Troup Leader. On Board of Directors of AYSO, held positions as Treasurer and Secretary – at the Region Level. I’m now the Treasurer for the Area which encompasses several Regions. I volunteered with the School District as a parent and am still involved on several Committees at the School District Level, as well as, working with the Marching Band of La Puente High School in a supporting role. I’ve been on school site counsel, PTO, Parent Foundation, President of Band Boosters at Wilson H.S. for 8 yrs and ran their Golden State Field Classic which is a field tournament through some of the down turn from my first year we went from 35 bands to making almost \$30,000 to our leanest year was 15 bands making \$10,000. But was able see that swing back up before our youngest graduated. Have 3 Children, all went through schools here. The youngest is graduating from Whittier College and will be heading off to Stockton to the University of Puget Sound to become a Physical Therapist. Our middle child is in Fairbanks, Alaska, living the rugged life in a dry cabin and loving it. Our Oldest is here working for Edison.

- 1 Updates Scott Martin
 - After a discussion with Michael Hamilton with the Hacienda Heights Community Center. He has told us that we can return to our in-person meetings in July. So the plan is our July 19, 2021, meeting we will be back together again, socially distanced, practicing all CDC guidelines. There is a meeting that Eleanor and I will go to with Michael to discuss the logistics of the room for the board members and participants and members, the deployment of the gigantic screen which we purchased just before face to face meetings shut down.

- 2 Disaster Planning Challenge – First Aid Kit..... Maury Edwards
 - We started covering each section of this plan a few months ago. Scott combed through several disaster plans and compiled this set and asked if I would introduce this at our meetings this year.
 - This month our lesson is on First Aid Kits.
 - We probably all have some sort of First Aid Kit or shelf with bandages and other supplies.
 - However, what we are suggesting here is to have a First Aid Kit that will have all the essential supplies should there be a disaster. It also needs to be kept in a safe area that we can access should there be a disaster such as an earthquake or fire.
 - You could take the First Aid Supply Kit list and go out and buy all the items listed and check them off. However, what I found to be easier was going online and price out a commercial kit. They have a list of all the items in the kit. I checked that list against the “Challenge” Kit. I found I could buy a commercial First Aid Kit for about \$30 and then added to the kit items which are probably around the house anyways. The additional items for me were: Thermometer, Petroleum Jelly. Sunscreen, Neosporin, Rubbing Alcohol, and Hydrogen peroxide.

- 3 Fourth of July Parade Maury Edwards
- Each year Kiwanis organizes the annual parade.
 - This year similar to last year we will have a 35-car caravan.
 - The caravan route will be longer than last year to access more of Hacienda Heights.
 - The vehicles must be closed cars – No convertibles - No flat-bed trucks (unless all the people remain in the cab of the truck) with only decorations on the outside and/or on the bed).
